What a great start we have had! There is a poem outside Mrs. Gundel's class in the primary hallway that really speaks to our school community:

We are a box of crayons - each one of us unique - but when we come together - the picture is complete!

At Pacific Way, we embrace P.A.C.K. qualities - P for Positive ("I find the best in every situation") - A for Accountable ("I am responsible for my behavior") - C for Cooperative ("I work well with others toward a common goal") - K for Kind ("I treat other's the way I like to be treated"). We work together as a team to build a strong community! Over the past two weeks, we have focused on the virtue of **perseverance**. Instilling the idea that working hard, having goals, sticking with it, and overcoming obstacles is a huge part of learning and growth and gaining confidence. As we build a culture of thinking, creating learning spaces where thinking is valued, visible and actively promoted, we want to be very aware of the language we use when working with our students. Whatever we notice and name when giving feedback to our learners, we are reinforcing. So as we promote perseverance, which we want to see more of in our students, we are looking for opportunities to identify examples of that. I invite you to join us in promoting the virtues throughout the year, simply by noticing and naming them with your children at home as well. Starting next week, we will be focusing on the virtue of **helpfulness** (Oct.10-19), followed by **consideration** (Oct.23-Nov.3).

Welcome to our new CEA, Mrs. Christine Cleveland and our new Gr. 6/7 French prep teacher Mrs. Breanna Lofgren. We are delighted to have you join our team!

<u>Punctuality</u> - Just a friendly reminder that our doors open for students at 8:25 each morning. The expectation is that students will be in their classrooms ready to learn before the 8:30 bell. Being on time

is essential to getting the day off to a good start. If for any reason your child does arrive late, please remember that our morning announcements happen at 8:30, and during that time all students and adults are requested to stop, wait and listen carefully, until the announcements are complete. I really appreciate everyone's cooperation with this. It just sets a great tone for the day.

<u>Fall Weather</u> - Remember that the weather is starting to change to cooler weather. Please make sure your child is dressed appropriately for the weather as we encourage students to go out for **all** breaks.

<u>Morning Supervision</u> - Some students are being dropped off very early in the morning before classes begin. Please remember that there is NO supervision and that they are not allowed into the building until 8:25 when the first bell rings.

Fire Prevention Week 2017 is October 8 to 14, 2017

Fires are real, not just events in the news or movies. Fire is fast, extremely hot and spreads rapidly. It creates thick black toxic smoke that is even more deadly than flames! When fire strikes, seconds are important! There is no time to stop and think. Everyone needs to know what to do! Smoke alarms provide the early warning of the problem and a home fire escape plan will provide time to escape safely. Although we hope you never have to use it, planning and practising your home escape plan may one day save your life and the lives of your loved ones.

The 2017 Fire Prevention Week Campaign is "Every Second Counts: Plan 2 Ways Out!". This year's theme focuses on the importance of having a home fire escape plan with two ways out of every room in case there is a fire.


Here are some tips and recommendations for developing and practicing a home escape plan:

- Draw a map of your home with all members of your household, marking two exits from each room and a path to the outside from each exit.
- Practice your home fire drill twice a year. Conduct one at night and one during the day with everyone in your home, and practice using different ways out.
- Teach children how to escape on their own in case you can't help them.
- Make sure the number of your home is clearly marked and easy for the fire department to find.
- Close doors behind you as you leave this may slow the spread of smoke, heat, and fire.
- Once you get outside, stay outside. Never go back inside a burning building.

The fire service has again partnered with local schools to teach children and their families the importance of developing and practising a home fire drill. Children will learn these skills by completing an interactive fire safety worksheet – "Fire Safety Starts with You!" – provided by your local fire department. Those children successfully completing the activity booklet and the entry form and returning the entry form are eligible to enter to win one of six iPads.

Remember, fire safety starts with you!

FDUCATION TOPIC

The Board heard about the success of the 2017 Special Olympics BC Summer Games, which were hosted in Kamloops in early July. Special Olympics President and CEO Dan Howe told trustees that 1,570 athletes and coaches competed in the 11 sports offered. Many of the District's facilities were used to stage events or host athletes. "All of this would not have been possible if we didn't have (the District's) tremendous support," said Howe.

REPORTS FROM SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

CEA STAFFING REQUEST – To meet the needs of increased enrolment as well as an increase in the numbers of students with special education designation, the Board was asked to approve an additional 12.0 FTEs to the Certified Education Assistant budget. Trustees approved the request unanimously.

RURAL TEACHERS TEACHING ON CALL – The Board was told about an initiative that will see teachers teaching on call hired to specific full-time assignments in the communities of Barriere and Chase. The hiring of term-certain TTOC positions in these communities will address ongoing and historic problems filling short-term and temporary vacancies. This will be a one-year "experiment" that could be implemented in other rural communities in the future.

CHAIR REPORT

Chair Wade told trustees about the launch of the Maker Program in the district. Every elementary school this year will get a "maker kit" filled with tools and materials. The kits are designed to teach problem solving, critical thinking, collaboration and creativity.

The next public board meeting will take place October 2nd in Barriere at 7 p.m.
